<b>Traditional tale</b>	A story that has been retold over many years. Sometimes called a fairy tale.
<b>Setting</b>	Where a story takes place.
<b>Character</b>	A person or animal in a story.
<b>Hero/Heroine</b>	The main character in the story. A hero is usually a character who is good and well-liked.
<b>Villain</b>	The character who is the opposite of the hero. The villain could be mean, nasty or evil.
<b>Tradition</b>	A way of thinking, behaving or doing something that has been done by people or families for a long time.
